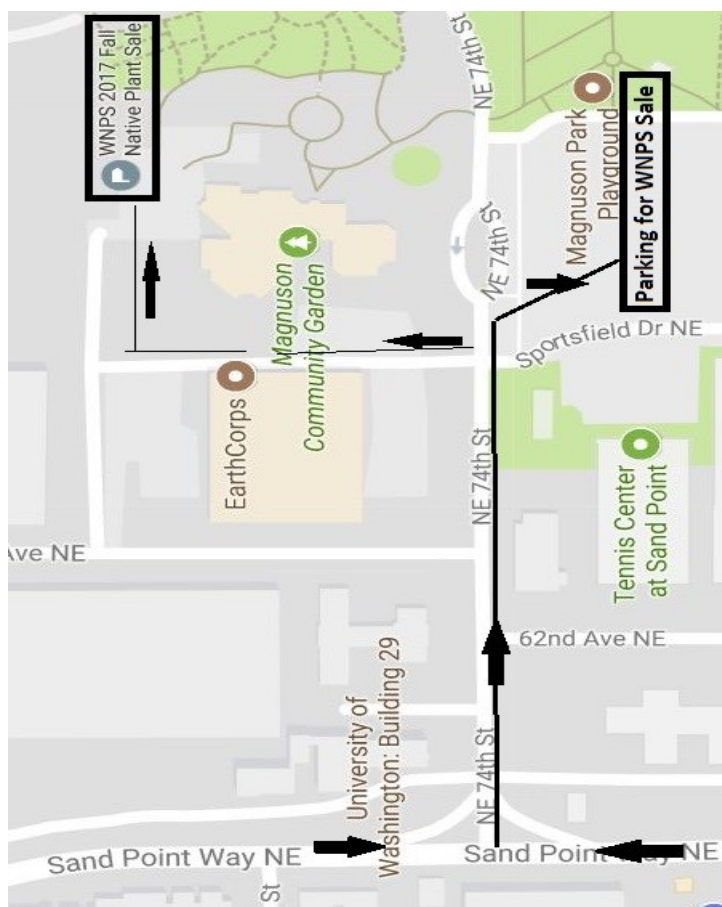

Follow the signs for parking then walk to the sale. You will be able to drive to the sale to pick up your purchases



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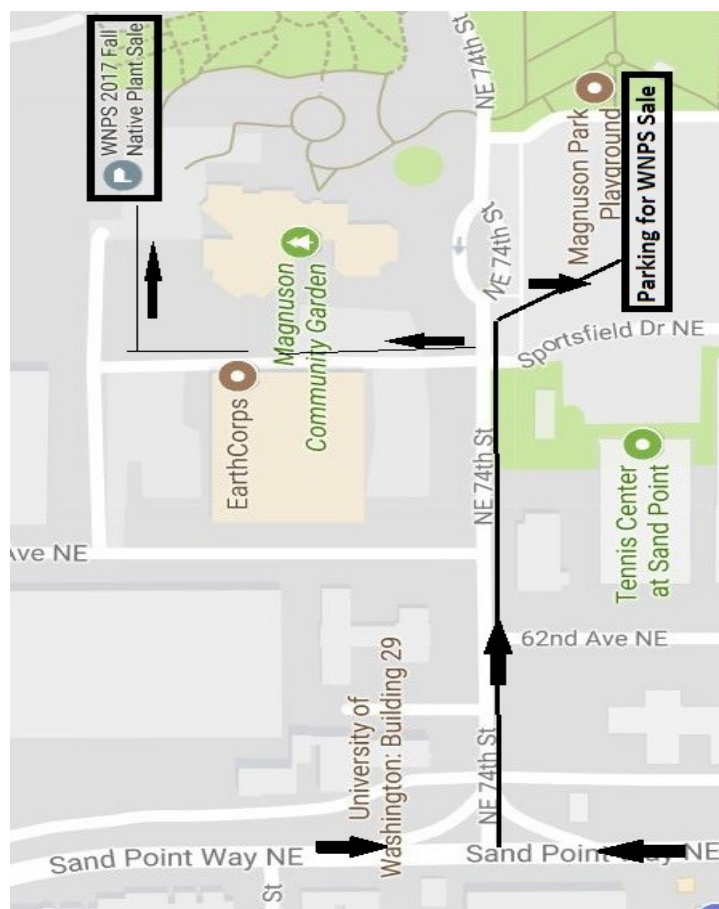

•*Thursday, Sept. 7 - Fungi; The Original Network*
Kim Traverse, President of the Puget Sound Mycological Society, will speak on a complex, largely unseen, world. Beyond the individual interactions between different fungi and plants, it seems there are also interconnections across many levels of taxa with fungi providing the network. This looks like cooperation and probably information processing. **(Mountaineers)**

•*Tuesday, October 10 - Pacific Feast: Where the Wild Things Are Delicious!*

Wild edibles from forest, field, and shores abound in the Pacific Northwest. Learn from forager, wilderness guide, professor and writer, **Jennifer Hahn**, about sustainably harvesting delicious, nutritious seaweeds, wild and weedy greens, berries, and tree tips to enhance your health and table in all seasons. Jennifer will share her favorite native species for a delicious back yard and her "stewardship guidelines for foragers." **(Bellevue Botanical Garden)**

•*Thursday, November 2 - Climate Change Impacts on PNW Plant Communities*

Janneke Hille Ris Lambers, UW Professor of Biology, will share current knowledge, including her own studies, on factors that suggest how climate change will influence the plants and animals with which we share our planet. This is one of the most challenging problems ecologists face. **(Mountaineers)**

•*Thursday, December 7 - Coast Salish Ethnobotany and Lessons for Food System Resiliency*

T. Abe Lloyd, Ethnobotanist and Director of Salal: The Cascadian Food Institute, sees food at the nexus point for our relationship with the earth. He will share the work of the Institute in applying the lessons of Coast Salish ethnobotany to supply vital nourishment while supporting biodiversity, ecological integrity and soil stability. **(Mountaineers)**

•*Tuesday, Feb 13 - Learn to Identify the Common Mosses and Liverworts of Western Washington*
